2nd Saturday –Santeros of the Classic Period in New Mexico:1795 to 1845

From 1795 to 1845, three Santeros in New Mexico helped to define traditional art in New Mexico. On April 10th, at 1:00 PM Dr. Kathleen Killorin presents on the Laguna Santero, Molleno, and Rafaél Aragón, as they are represented in the Albuquerque Museum's collection, San Francisco de Asís Church in Rancho de Taos, and Holy Cross Church in Santa Cruz, New Mexico.

Killorin is an anthropologist and retired educator that taught for APS and at the University of Albuquerque. She conducted field work in Japan from 1963 – 1964 and in Spain 1968 – 1969.

Learn basic wet felting technique with award-winning, Navajo artist Eliseo Curley. Eliseo raises his own Navajo-Churro sheep, moving them to the Carrizo Mountains in the summer as did his relatives before him. Although he uses the wool to felt and weave, he also raises the sheep for meat.

Eliseo has been working with churro fiber for many years, while volunteering with the Sheep is Life Celebrations and Diné Be Iiná, Inc., a non-for-profit organization that supports Navajo-Churro sheep on the Navajo Nation. Consequently, he has many good stories to share with students in the afternoon class. Eliseo's current felting art will also be on exhibit during the workshop.

150 years ago, the county sheriff's office was the foundation of law enforcement within the New Mexico territory. During this time, an onset of lawlessness encroached upon New Mexico. Large counties, fee systems, and a lack of resources contributed to the breakdown law and order during this period.

Don Bullis is an author, has served in a number of positions, retired newspaper editor/columnist, and peace officer. He retired in 2002 after serving as a New Mexico deputy sheriff, town marshal, organized crime commissioner, and criminal intelligence operational supervisor.

Gloria Zamora, Author of *Sweet Nata: Growing up in Rural New Mexico*, offers an authentic perspective on the Hispanic experience in New Mexico. Zamora reveals interactions with her parents, grandparents, and other family members that influenced her most in life. Set during the 1950s and 1960s in Mora and Corrales, New Mexico, *Sweet Nata*, is a unique glimpse into daily family and a community life. Aric Chopito is one of the few traditional weavers practicing in Zuni Pueblo today. Aric has devoted his time to the passage of knowledge for future generations to carry on. Today his two sons, Andrew and Aden, are award winning traditional artists in their own right, exhibiting displayed works and winning best in show. Most recently, Aden and Andrew Chopito have worked to replicated a 4 ft turkey feather blanket with several thousand feathers; similar to the blankets made by ancestors of present-day Hopi, Zuni, and Rio Grande Pueblos.
